The 2011 Arthur R. Smith Awards

The Arthur R. Smith Awards were created in the name of the founder of the Calgary Homeless Foundation (CHF) to recognize and honour front-line staff, teams and volunteers who provide housing and support to individuals who are at risk of or experiencing homelessness Calgary. These awards are open to staff and volunteers, excluding executive directors.

Successful nominations showed that nominees' results contributed to the long-term goal of ending homelessness by helping people move towards independence in housing. Award recipients were seen as demonstrating exemplary leadership, innovation and commitment to clients. Nominators included compelling stories from clients or observers.

The selection of winners has been made by the CHF's Community and Stakeholder Relations Committee.

About Arthur Smith



Hon. Col. Arthur R. Smith, OC, AOE, DFC, Hon. LLD

May 16, 1919 - June 30, 2008

Arthur was a friend, colleague, mentor and so much more to the people involved with the CHF, as well as to many other Calgarians, Albertans and Canadians. Arthur understood the plight of people facing homelessness and helped others understand as well. His foresight, compassion and energy led him to develop the CHF in 1998. Before his passing, he provided wise counsel on the path forward with Calgary's 10 Year Plan to End Homelessness.

Dennis Halstead is a dedicated Calgarian who started his own food distribution initiative

44 years ago. His desire to help Calgary's less fortunate started when as a police officer, he would collect boots, toques and mitts and give them to homeless persons he came across.

He now serves approximately 70 working low-income families. Most have accommodation, but can't afford necessities such as food. Dennis' efforts are making a tangible difference in preventing family homelessness.

Dennis makes daily food collection trips every week. He has set up a mini-warehouse operating out of his garage, with shelving, refrigerators and deep freezers, where families can come one of three evenings a week to pick up as many items as they need. When the family is large (such as a mother who has eight children), Dennis makes up a food hamper ahead of time.

The Dube family shared how Dennis' support helped their in-laws, who were financially strapped as the father-in-law had back surgery and was unable to go back to work. Rick Long, who now volunteers with Dennis, first came to Calgary looking for work and ended up living in his car. Dennis was the one who took him in and helped him find groceries and a small apartment.

Scott Calling Last

As an experienced outreach worker for 15 years, Scott Calling Last has been helping some of



Calgary's most vulnerable people get into homes with the support they need. For example, he intervened for an elderly, incontinent, blind woman, who was seen as "un-housable" due to her addictions and the conflict surrounding her. Against all odds, Scott found her a care-home bed, and she has been happily housed and sober for several years.

He excels at crisis counselling, calmly presenting options to his clients, while encouraging them to make appropriate and healthier decisions. As his nominators explain, "People on the streets respond to Scott and his fierce determination to do the best by them because he treats them with respect and dignity. He puts

Scott has also generously shared his knowledge, by training others in case management 'best practices' and giving presentations on cultural

sensitivity. He has taught his methods to professionals in the medical, social services, policing and addictions support fields, all the while working to change attitudes and foster respect and compassion for those he serves.

The Inn from the Cold (the Inn) first began offering case management services to families in 2003. Since then, the service has grown into a 13-person team, offering an integrative and collaborative approach to ending homelessness. In 2011, the team facilitated housing placements for 133 families staying in the

Inn's shelter, as well as providing homelessness prevention services to 267 families and facilitating support and networking to 219 families that visited the shelter.

The team has a unified, service-oriented approach to client care. First, families are assigned to Primary and Secondary Family Support Workers to ensure that the unique needs of family members are met quickly and appropriately. Second, the

entire case management team meets weekly to discuss cases, explore new and emerging trends and strategies, and maximize team effectiveness. Experienced workers are partnered with new team members to ensure that constant 'hands-on' learning is provided and no one works in isolation.

The team is a 24/7 operation, with family support workers scheduled every day including weekends, holidays and evenings. By going beyond traditional service hours, they can provide immediate assistance to clients experiencing crisis or trauma.

No matter how complex the issues may be, the team follows the mantra that no family should be left behind. A family that arrived at the shelter in 2009 exemplifies this. They arrived in a state of crisis without existing networks or family supports and lacking the necessary life skills to transition to big-city living. In the last three years, the family has overcome incredible obstacles, including addiction, trauma, family violence, mental health, lack of problem-solving skills, and lack of proper parenting structures.

As the nominators explain, "The journey took consistency, persistence and the development of a trusting relationship to assist this family to a place of stability, even when, at times, their stability was thwarted by regression into old trauma."

Though the children were taken away, through her hard work, life skills training, and support from the Case Management Team, the mother now has the children back in her care. "The team works intentionally and diligently with the understanding that subtle changes take time for the more obvious changes to happen."
